Coastal Cleanup Day and National Estuaries Week...Together Again!

Saturday, September 17 is both the kickoff for National Estuaries Week (NEW), AND Coastal Cleanup Day (CCD)! From 9:00am-12:pm, TBF hosts its 12th Annual Coastal Cleanup Day event. TBF returns to the dunes between LAX and El Segundo beaches, also known as the LAX Dunes, to remove invasive species of plants. Last year's event drew 70 volunteers who collected over 2,000 pounds of invasive vegetation! These invasives take space away from healthy and native species of plants, much as trash invades our beaches, parks and streets. TBF again partners with Friends of LAX Dunes to help restore Los Angeles County's largest remaining dune system. Hydrodynamic Study is LAUNCHED!

On July 25th, the Santa Monica Bay National Estuary Program (SMBNEP) was onboard when project partners, Los Angeles County Sanitation, deployed a pCO₂ sensor into Santa Monica Bay. This sensor will collect data on the level of carbon dioxide dissolved in the water. Additional sensors will be added in the near future that measure dissolved oxygen and pH. Combined, these sensors form an array that will collect data on these key chemical attributes of the ocean water. The information gained from these data will help us understand how ocean acidification is manifesting off our coast. This sensor marks the start of SMBNEP involvement in this regional effort. Our project partners include USEPA, UC Davis, UCLA, City of Los Angeles Environmental Monitoring Division, Scripps Institute of Oceanography, Southern California Coastal Water Research Project, and the Southern California Coastal Ocean Observing System.



Over 23,000 Gallons of Stormwater Captured by Metro Grant Rain Gardens

TBF recently completed a rain garden installation project to capture stormwater runoff, allow for significant potable water savings, and to create visually-stunning native gardens lined with drought-tolerant plants. The purpose of this grant through the Metropolitan Conservation District's Innovation Conservation Program was to install four rain gardens and calculate potable water savings and stormwater capture capacity for each garden. The collected data revealed that property owners reduced their water use between 70 - 94%, overall, and collectively captured over 23,000 gallons of stormwater! Besides water savings and stormwater capture potential, these beautiful native gardens provide sanctuary to local birds and are a haven for insects and pollinators. Over 50% of the Bay's Cities are Part of Clean Bay Certified

With nearly 30,000 restaurants, bars, and eateries in Santa Monica Bay, the restaurant industry can make a tremendous impact on public health and the health of our environment. TBF's [Clean Bay Certified](#) program works with cities to inspect and certify restaurants that go beyond legal requirements to stop stormwater pollution and implement ocean-friendly business practices.

TBF is proud to partner with the cities of Malibu, Santa Monica, Culver City, Manhattan Beach, Inglewood, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Torrance, and Rancho Palos Verdes. TBF welcomes the newest Clean Bay Certified cities: Palos Verdes Estates and Rolling Hills Estates. All cities have attended this year's inspector's training, hosted by the City of Torrance. Many cities have begun using the updated [inspection checklist](#) that includes more stringent criterion including: zero-use of polystyrene take-out containers, regular training of employees regarding environmental initiatives, use of less toxic, biodegradable and phosphate-free cleaning products, and more.

TBF reached another milestone by gaining the support of the Regional Water Quality Control Board with an official [letter of support](#). With the Board's backing, TBF hopes to add the remaining Santa Monica Bay Watershed cities (a total of 19) to the Clean Bay Certified partnership.


