SMBRC Technical Advisory Committee is Reappointed for 2-Year Term

The SMBRC Governing Board reappointed the existing members of the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) to another two-year term. The eight members of the TAC are drawn from universities, research institutions, and agencies in the region and are all renowned experts in a range of scientific fields such as water and sediment quality, intertidal ecology, stream and wetland, fish biology, and environmental toxicology. The TAC functions as an unbiased scientific panel that provides reasoned recommendations on research projects and project implementation priorities to the Governing Board. They led the development, and authored a majority of the *State of the Bay 2015* report. One of the top priorities for the TAC during its new term is to assist the SMBRC in understanding the potential impacts of climate change in Santa Monica Bay area and what steps can be taken to address these impacts.

Update: RFP for Prop. 84 Funds

The SMBRC TAC serving in its official capacity as the Clean Beach Task Force has reviewed ten projects submitted in response to a request for proposals, making technical recommendations. State Water Board staff and staff assigned to the SMBRC are in the process of further evaluations of the proposals. A suite of recommendations will be brought before the Executive Committee and Governing Board in the coming months. Approximately \$9 million dollars are available to support the proposed projects which are designed to reduce pollution and enhance habitat values for wildlife.

Rodenticides and our Watershed

During the public comment period of the October 2014 SMBRC Governing Board meeting, Kian Schulman and Joel Schulman from Poison Free Malibu voiced their concern regarding anticoagulant rodent poisons spreading throughout the ecosystem, fatally impacting large carnivore populations in the Santa Monica Mountains. Governing Board members and TBF Executive Director Tom Ford recognized the issue's value and quickly requested that TBF staff explore options to address this problem.

The Bay Foundation responded through various initiatives including:

- adding the non-use of poison bait boxes to the Clean Bay Restaurant Certification options and supporting this action through outreach to restaurants and city staff;
- contributing expertise to the construction of a wildlife corridor that will allow mountain lions, bobcats, and other wildlife to cross the 101 freeway, which will promote wider geographic distribution and genetic diversity; and
- supporting partner municipalities, like the City of Malibu, to prohibit the use of anticoagulant rodenticides locally and regionally.

In a letter of support to the City of Malibu Planning Commission and City Council, Ford asked that the Planning Commission and City Council “recognize the importance and sense of urgency” behind approving the amendments to their Local Coastal Program (LCP) Land Use Plan and Local Implementation Plan to prohibit the use of anticoagulant rodenticides. Currently, the City of Malibu’s Planning Commission is considering options for amendments to the LCP that will prohibit the use of rodenticides, which went before the Planning Commission at their February 16 meeting.

Thanks to the work and leadership of organizations like Poison Free Malibu, former Los Angeles County Supervisor Zev Yaroslavsky, State Assemblyman Richard Bloom, and Malibu Mayor John Sibert, Los Angeles County and many cities have already passed resolutions to prohibit the use of rodenticides. And TBF would like to thank the restaurants, property owners, and merchants who no longer use rodent poisons.


Inglewood & Culver City Join ‘Clean Bay Certified’ for Your Dining Pleasure!

Rain Garden Installations and Water Conservation

In 2013, the Metropolitan Water District awarded an Innovative Conservation Program grant to TBF to install four rain gardens on residential properties and assess potable water savings and stormwater capture potential. After several months of monitoring conventional outdoor water use at each site, TBF completed full lawn removals and rain garden installations using California native drought-tolerant vegetation. Over 5,000 square feet of heavily-watered grass was removed, sprinkler systems were removed, the ground was contoured to create bioswales, and native vegetation was planted. All downspouts were retrofitted to flow into the bioswales and tested. Over 100 individuals contributed over 700 volunteer hours to help implement these gardens. Post-implementation monitoring has already shown average potable water savings between 73 and 94%, and the gardens have easily captured all runoff from multiple one-inch storms this winter. Community Outreach and Habitat Restoration Grant

Southern California Edison awarded TBF a grant to continue monthly community restoration events, particularly at the LAX Dunes Preserve. At over 300 acres, the LAX / El Segundo Dune complex is the largest remaining fragment of contiguous dunes in southern California and provides habitat for many species, some of which are uniquely endemic to the area. Invasive vegetation such as mustard, filaree, iceplant, and Russian thistle out-compete and limit native plant propagation. On the first Saturday of each month, hundreds of volunteers have removed, and continue to remove, **several tons** of invasive vegetation at this important and scenic location. The State of the Bay 2015 report garnered attention in January, with Tom Ford speaking on [KABC 790 AM](#) radio several times, and being interviewed by [KPCC](#) radio for “All Things Considered”. 
