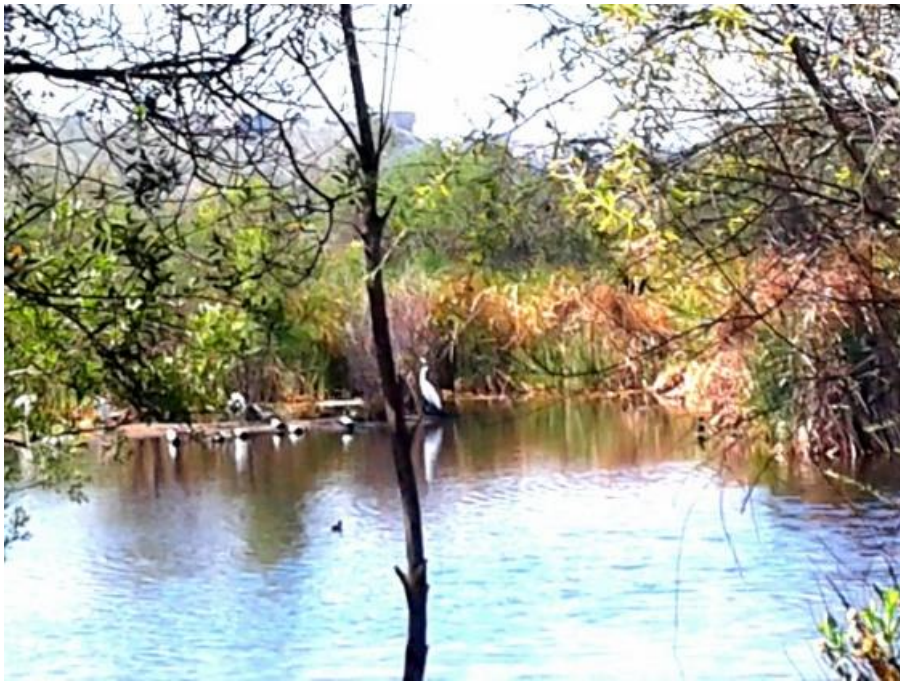
After more than ten years of protest to Not "Bulldoze Ballona", it is uber-high time to revisit and -wonder and pass on to my grandkids this precious ecological gem!

Subject: Resolution on Access to Ballona Wetlands

Dr. Wang:

It is my understanding that you and your staff are currently working on a draft, non-binding resolution regarding access to the Ballona Wetlands Ecological Reserve, which will be considered by the full Commission's Governing Board in June. Public access to natural areas, when properly balanced with a strong focus on habitat and species protection, has been shown to be extremely beneficial to communities, especially disadvantaged kids. Research in child development shows there are tremendous benefits of connecting children to nature. Children who spend quality time outside develop stronger immune systems and healthy emotional coping skills; learning about nature teaches empathy, pattern recognition, social skills and scientific curiosity; and fostering connection to nature is one of the best ways to spark concern for the planet. I urge those drafting the resolution to consider the urgency and need for public access, the substantial investment of funds that have already been spent to assure access to areas of the ecological reserve north of Ballona Creek, and also the Commission's previous support for opening the gate at Fiji Way. I look forward to reviewing the resolution when it becomes available.
