We are pleased to announce that a meeting of the Santa Monica Bay Restoration Commission's (SMBRC's) Watershed Advisory Council (WAC) will be held on Thursday, March 5, 2020 from 10:00 am to 12:00 pm at the Edward C. Little Water Recycling Facility in El Segundo.

The purpose of this meeting is to inform and receive input on the development of the Santa Monica Bay National Estuary Program's (SMBNEP) Fiscal Year 2021 Annual Work Plan (FY21 Work Plan). The FY21 Work Plan starts on October 1, 2020 and runs through September 30, 2021.

The meeting will be conducted in a facilitated workshop format in collaboration with the Bay Foundation (TBF), SMBRC's partner of the SMBNEP. A draft of the FY21 Work Plan will be presented at the SMBRC Governing Board meeting scheduled for February 20, 2020 and be presented again at the WAC meeting on March 5. The draft FY21 Work Plan will also be made available online prior to the WAC meeting.

About the Santa Monica Bay Restoration Commission (SMBRC)

Established in 2002 by the California State legislature the SMBRC is a non-regulatory, locally based state entity, and serves as Management Conference of the Santa Monica Bay National Estuary Program. The SMBRC is charged with overseeing and promoting the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP) by securing and leveraging funding to put solutions into action, building public-private partnerships, promoting cutting edge research and technology, facilitating stakeholder-driven consensus processes, and raising public awareness. The CCMP focuses on three priority areas— improving water quality, conserving and rehabilitating natural resources, and protecting the Bay's benefits and values to people—to ensure the long-term health of the 266-square mile Bay and its 400-square-mile watershed.
